Administrator's Report – March-April 2021

Announcements & Important Meetings

Election Directors' Meetings

We hosted election directors' meetings on March 18 and April 15. Topics discussed included voter registration, legislation, the upcoming inventory process, and the project to replace the electronic pollbooks for the 2022 elections. A summary of the March 18 meeting was provided with the meeting materials, and a summary of the April 15 meeting will be provided when it is complete.

FY2022 Budget & FY2021 Deficiency Requests

The General Assembly recently approved our FY2022 budget and deficiency fund request for FY2021. The approved FY2022 budget includes funding for the 2022 Primary Election, including a statewide voter education campaign and the development of an online election judges' training module, and two additional positions. The legislature did not reduce our budget but added some reporting requirements related to the two IT projects (a new election management system and new electronic pollbooks) and cost sharing between the SBE and the local boards of elections.

The deficiency request for FY2021 included funds for unanticipated costs to conduct the 2020 General Election, funding for a voting system lease payment, and three legal settlements. The majority of the unanticipated costs were for the printing, mailing and postage of the mail-in ballot applications and mail-in ballot packets. Other costs include expenses related to the call center, additional ballot drop boxes, voter education campaign, personal protective equipment, and other mailings and support.

HR 1 & S 1 - Federal Election Legislation

On March 3, 2021, the U.S. House of Representatives passed H.R. 1. This legislation has widespread impact on election administration with provisions ranging from voter registration to mail-in voting to election administration to campaign finance to redistricting. In mid-March, similar legislation - S. 1 - was introduced in the US Senate. The Senate's Committee on Rules and Administration is expected to mark up the bill in May.

We have participated in calls with the Senate Committee's majority and minority staff sharing election officials' thoughts on various provisions. This legislation, as introduced, will significantly impact election administration in all states, and we will continue to monitor and share information about the impact on election administration in Maryland.

Maryland Association of Election Officials (MAEO) - Annual Conference

MAEO is hosting its annual conference in Ocean City the week of August 23. We will provide more information as the agenda and registration information is developed. Discussions on whether to host SBE's biennial meeting during this conference are on-going.

Election Reform and Management

Manual Audit

State law requires that election officials conduct a manual audit of randomly selected ballots after each statewide general election. This manual audit is in addition to an independent software audit of all of the ballot images created in an election.

The manual audit from the 2020 General Election was completed on February 26, 2021 with the manual audit of Washington County. In 21 of the 24 local jurisdictions, there were zero differences between the results of the manual audit and the voting system. In the remaining three local jurisdictions, two

discrepancies were determined to be human error, and the other discrepancy was a one vote discrepancy and well below the 0.5% threshold to trigger more auditing.

Overall, 62,084 ballots from all 24 local jurisdictions were manually audited, resulting in a statewide audit contest vote discrepancy of 0.0064%. Total, there were 3,037,026 ballots cast for President, which results in a statewide contest vote discrepancy of 0.00013%. Simply put, these audits showed that the voting system accurately counted votes. As required by Election Law Article, §11-309(d)(4), a report of the manual audit was posted on our [Ballot Audit Plan webpage](#). Information about the independent software audit is also posted there.

U.S. Election Assistance Commission (EAC) Data Report

After each general election, the EAC asks states to complete an extensive data survey. The survey - called the Election Administration and Voting Survey - requests data on voter registration, voter turnout, mail-in voting by military and overseas voters and domestic, civilian voters, provisional voting, voting locations, pollworkers, and voting systems.

The initial submission for the EAC's 2020 Election Administration and Voting Survey was due and SBE submitted timely on February 1, 2021. The EAC returned the data report two weeks later with suggested corrections, and a final certified report was submitted and accepted by the EAC on March 6, 2021. Tracey Hartman and Susan Tang completed this report.

High Speed Envelope Sorter - Demonstration

In late March, the District of Columbia Board of Elections demonstrated their high-speed envelope sorter. This office uses this machine to sort return envelopes with voted ballots based on user-defined criteria (e.g., envelopes without a signature). Several local boards attended the demonstration and are interested in learning more about how these solutions can be used in the 2022 elections.

Voter Registration

MDVOTERS

MDVOTERS is the State's statewide voter registration, candidacy and election management database. It is a centralized database accessed by SBE and the local boards of elections and contains the "official list of registered voters." It is also used in the absentee and provisional voting process and to process petitions, assign and pay election judges, and file candidates. The voter registration data in MDVOTERS is used in the electronic pollbooks and the online [voter look-up](#) and [polling place locator](#).

MDVOTERS 7.5 version will be released on April 26 and includes the full integration of the Agency Election Management System (AEMS). The AEMS system will replace all functionality of the legacy Election Management System while offering enhanced system configuration abilities along with a more modern experience. Some of the functionality includes the generation of web accessible HTML candidate lists and election results pages, ballot generation and ballot style reporting, write-in vote result processing, candidate nomination certificates, candidate commissions of election, canvass sheets for certifying elections and electoral college documentation in addition to providing an interface to the voting system and other modules within MDVOTERS.

Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) Transactions

Under federal and State law, MVA is required to offer voter registration during certain MVA transactions. Since MVA is the primary source of new voter registration and updated voter registration information, we provide monthly data on voter registration activity generated by MVA transactions.

During February, MVA collected the following voter registration transactions:

Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC)

ERIC is a non-profit organization, formed in 2012, with the sole mission of assisting states to improve the accuracy of voter registration rolls. Currently, 30 states and the District of Columbia form ERIC's membership.

Each member submits to ERIC its voter registration and motor vehicle licensee data for comparison and review. Various reports are generated and returned to the states for action. These reports include voters who have moved within their state, voters who moved out of state, duplicate registrations in the same state, and death records from the Social Security Administration (SSA).

Maryland receives these reports every other month, and each local board of elections process these reports within 2 weeks of receipt. Beginning May 2021, Maryland will receive SSA death and in-state duplicate records on a monthly basis.

MDVOTERS Audits

Janet Smith is a voter registration auditor for SBE. These audits include, but are not limited to:

- New registrations;
- Changes to voter records;
- Timely processing of reports;
- Cancellations;
- Party changes;
- Absentee application

Once audits are reported to the local board of elections for correction, Ms. Smith audits those records to make sure the corrections have been made.

MDVOTERS Access Security

In order to access the statewide voter registration database, users must have a 2 factor authentication token. The MDVOTERS user accounts are audited frequently and unused accounts are removed. Any token that has not been immediately reassigned must be returned to SBE.

Non-Citizen Registration and Voting

Non-citizens that registered to vote are identified and forwarded to the Office of the State Prosecutor (OSP.) OSP and SBE are working to improve the process and review and identify records identified from March 20, 2020 to March 31, 2021. During that time, 224 individuals had records canceled for non-citizen status and five of these individuals had voting history. Overall during that period 219,578 individual voter registration records were cancelled due to other actions - moved out of state, death, voter request and routine voter list maintenance actions.

Candidacy and Campaign Finance (CCF) Division

Candidacy

February 23, 2021 was the first day candidates can file candidacy paperwork for the 2022 Gubernatorial Election cycle. Approximately 20 candidates have filed to date.

Campaign Finance

The prohibition on fundraising during the legislative session has ended.

The next disclosure report due is for persons doing business with State government entities and persons employing lobbyists. They are required to file a Disclosure of Contributions. Reports are due every six months (November 30 and May 31) with the transaction period ending the last day of the month prior to the due date.

Enforcement

The CCF Division received payment for the following civil penalties:

1. Ironworkers Political Action League PAC paid \$250.00 on February 26, 2021 for the failure to record all contributions and expenditures.
2. Friends of Dr. Kathleen White committee paid \$600.00 on March 3, 2021 for the failure to record all contributions and expenditures.
3. Craig Carozza-Caviness for county council committee paid \$450.00 on March 3, 2021 for the failure to record all contributions and expenditures.
4. Citizens for Jeffrey Kenney committee paid \$200.00 on April 09, 2021 for the failure to record all contributions and expenditures and for filing affidavits instead of a Campaign Finance Report.
5. Citizens for Patrick Gutierrez committee paid \$500.00 on April 12, 2021 for the failure to record all contributions and expenditures.

Financial Disclosure Statements

This is a reminder that the Board members need to file a financial disclosure statement with the Ethics Commission. The deadline is April 30, 2021.

MD CRIS Contract - Options Approval

There are two contracts that support Maryland Campaign Reporting Information System (MD CRIS), a browser-based campaign committee information and finance reporting system with a module for business contributions to election campaigns. One contract (MDCRIS AP) supports and provides system maintenance and development, business process support and documentation, database management, cybersecurity support to audit the application software and for web security, and incident reporting for the application. The other contract (MD CRIS DC) provides web hosting and security monitoring for MDCRIS, includes data center hardware and software, and provides security monitoring to protect against denial of service (DOS) or breach of personal identifying information (PII). The vendor for both contracts is Netorian, LLC.

At its March 10 meeting, the Board of Public Works (BPW) approved exercising option periods for both MD CRIS contracts. The option period is for 2 years (April 1, 2021- March 31, 2023). After the current term, the contracts have one two-year option left for renewal.

Voting Systems Division

Voting System Upgrade

Although planning is ongoing, SBE has begun initial testing of the voting system software suite and firmware upgrades. The voting system upgrade contains significant benefits to the voting equipment and back-end processes associated with election-related activities. On April 19, 2021, SBE began the State certification process for the voting system software suite. The certification timeline will include a public demonstration period for the voting system as defined in COMAR.

Transportation Contract

At its March 10 meeting, the Board of Public Works (BPW) approved exercising the final option period for our contract with Interstate Moving Solutions. Under this contract, Interstate delivers election equipment and supplies to early voting and election day locations and returns the same equipment and supplies to the local boards' warehouses, schedules, manages, and tracks deliveries, and follows SBE's strict security procedures for moving this equipment and supplies. The option period is for 2 years (July 1, 2021 - June 30, 2023) and covers transporting election equipment and supplies for the 2022 elections.

Project Management Office (PMO)

Inventory Management

The FY21 Inventory Audit started on February 1 and will conclude on June 30, 2021. The current statewide inventory audit completion is 70.26%.

Electronic Pollbook Replacement Project

Since the legacy pollbooks are end of life and are no longer manufactured, we need a more flexible and updated solution to support the 2022 and future elections. The effort to replace the legacy pollbook solution started in FY20 when the initial project documents were completed. While SBE was supporting the 2020 elections, the project team drafted the procurement documents, and the Request for Proposals was issued in November 2020. The deadline for vendors to submit proposals was January 29, 2021. Five responses were received, one of which failed to meet the requirements of the RFP and was eliminated from consideration. An evaluation committee was selected to review and rate the technical and financial proposals and equipment.

The PMO and other SBE divisions continued working on tasks related to this project. The project team includes the PMO, individuals from SBE's Information Technology and System Division, and contractor support. Highlights of the project include:

- The procurement of a new pollbook solution is in the evaluation phase. The evaluation committee is performing its technical evaluation, which included oral presentations from the vendors. The next event in the evaluation phase is the on-site evaluation of the vendors' equipment, and this phase is expected to be completed in mid-June.
- There are four new contract project team members. Cheryl Jordan is the Agile Coach/Project Manager responsible for leading the Agile implementation phase of the project. In addition, Sherrell Wilson, Ava Pitts, and Alfred Jones are the contract Testers hired.
- The project team continued to maintain the project communication with the local boards via monthly project status meetings.

Other

SBE has a warehouse in Glen Burnie, which also has training facilities, and two SBE employees work at the warehouse. These individuals continued:

- Disposing of equipment and supplies through the State's auction and recycling options

- Returning of local board equipment temporarily stored at the warehouse for the 2020 General Election
- Receiving local boards' equipment and supplies for temporary storage
- Coordinating the use of the warehouse facility for the on-site training of the newly added pollbook contract project team members. The coordination included making sure that everyone was adhering to the COVID-19 distancing and face coverings guidelines.

Information Systems & Technology and Security

Both Nikia Wilbon-Turner and Shafiq Satterfield have been given expanded responsibilities towards making the IT Services & Technology Division (IS&T) an even more cohesive unit in support of election activities.

Software Development (Director: Nikia Wilbon-Turner)

Nikia is expanding her technical management role to include MDVOTERS, Voter Services and now the Pollbook/EPIC team. Nikia will apply her proven technical leadership capabilities to the other software development teams within the IS&T Division to establish a consistent set of methodologies, tools and processes. This is a significant and important step forward for SBE and I am very confident in Nikia's ability to make a positive difference in this new role.

IT Project Management (Director: Shafiq Satterfield)

Shafiq will add to his current duties to establish and build this new division within IT Systems and Technology. Shafiq's goal is to work with all teams within IS&T to create and implement a consistent set of IT project management processes and methodologies to enhance visibility and consistency into the way IT project management is conducted at SBE.

Legislation

The Department of Legislative Services issues a summary of legislation following the end of the 90 day session. The election section of the *90 Day Report - A Review of the 2021 Legislative Session* is included with this report. We are identifying the requirements of each new law.

ASSISTANT ATTORNEY GENERAL'S REPORT

April 22, 2021

1. *Fusaro v. Davitt et al.*, No. 20-1879 (U.S.C.A. for the 4th Cir.). No change from the last update. Plaintiff Dennis Fusaro brought a complaint in federal court alleging that Maryland violates the First and Fourteenth Amendments by limiting access to the voter list to Maryland voters and only for purposes related to the electoral process. On September 4, 2018, the State defendants' motion to dismiss the complaint was granted, and the plaintiff appealed. On July 12, 2019, the Fourth Circuit vacated the dismissal order, and remanded the case for further proceedings. The parties then conducted discovery and briefed dispositive summary judgment motions. On July 14, 2020, the Court awarded Summary Judgment to the defendants on the issue of whether the "electoral process" requirement was unconstitutionally vague, and declined to reach the issue of whether Maryland's registered voter requirement violates the First Amendment. Plaintiff has appealed to the United States Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit, and briefing is now complete. Oral argument has not yet been scheduled.

2. *Johnson v. Prince George's County Board of Elections*, No. CAL16-42799 (Cir. Ct. Prince Georges Cnty.). No change from the last update. This case involves a challenge under the U.S. Constitution and Maryland Constitution and Declaration of Rights to the SBE's alleged failure to provide information and access to voter registration and voting resources to eligible voters detained by the Prince Georges County Department of Correction during the 2016 election. The case had been originally filed in the Circuit Court for Prince Georges County but was removed on the basis of the federal claims asserted by the Plaintiffs. On February 27, 2018, the U.S. District Court for the District of Maryland granted SBE's motion to dismiss the Plaintiffs' federal claims, declined to exercise jurisdiction over the state claims, and remanded the case to the Circuit Court for further proceedings. The parties are awaiting further direction from the court.

3. *National Federation of the Blind, Inc., et al. v. Lamone et al.*, No. 1:19-CV-02228-ELH (U.S. District Court, D. Md.). On August 1, 2019, the National Federation of the Blind ("NFB"), NFB's Maryland chapter, and three individual plaintiffs filed a lawsuit against the State Administrator and the individual members of the State Board of Elections alleging that SBE's BMD policy has, in practice, violated the rights of voters with disabilities "to an equal opportunity vote in person by a secret ballot," in violation of Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act. Plaintiffs seek an order requiring the State Board "in all future elections to offer BMDs to

every in-person voter as the default method of voting, with paper ballots offered only to those voters who affirmatively opt out of using the BMD or in cases where there are long lines of people waiting to vote.” On September 3, 2019, defendants filed a motion to dismiss the complaint, and on September 20, 2019, plaintiffs filed a motion for a preliminary injunction, seeking relief in time for the November 2020 election. On February 10, 2020, the court denied the defendants’ motion to dismiss, and denied the plaintiffs’ motion for preliminary injunction, and the parties proceeded to discovery. On October 6, 2020, the parties filed a joint motion to extend the discovery deadline to December 9, 2020, which was granted by the Court. On November 12, 2020, the parties filed a joint motion to stay the case for 60 days to allow for a focused period of settlement discussions, which was also granted by the Court. The stay has since been extended several times, and is now set to expire April 26, 2021.

4. *Chong Su Yi v. Hogan*, Nos. 464985, 466396, 480720, 480721, 480722, 480723 (Cir. Ct. Montgomery Cty.). On September 8, 2019, plaintiff Chong Su Yi filed two complaints in the Circuit Court for Montgomery County challenging the results of Maryland’s 2018 elections, and naming Governor Larry Hogan as defendant (Nos. 464985, 466396). Specifically, Mr. Yi argued that the results of that election are invalid because of the use of religious facilities as polling places, that the State’s use of “scanners” to tabulate ballots is unconstitutional and/or not permitted by federal law, and that the State’s identification of candidates’ party affiliations on the general election ballot is not permitted by State law. Mr. Yi amended his complaints, and in January 2019 both of his amended complaints were dismissed by the Circuit Court. On January 21, 2020, Mr. Yi appealed from the dismissal in No. 466396. (Mr. Yi had also previously filed interlocutory appeals from non-final orders, but these were dismissed by the Court of Special Appeals.) On November 4, 2020, the Court of Special Appeals dismissed Mr. Yi’s appeal for failure to file a civil information report, but on November 30, 2020 granted Mr. Yi’s motion for reconsideration and reinstated the appeal. On April 16, 2021, Mr. Yi filed an informal appellant’s brief with the Court of Special Appeals. On April 22, 2021, that brief was rejected for failure to include a certificate of service, and Mr. Yi was directed to refile his brief with the appropriate certificates within 30 days.

Meanwhile, on March 6, 2020, Mr. Yi filed four complaints in the Circuit Court for Montgomery County (Nos. 480720, 480721, 480722, 480723) asserting substantially identical claims to those asserted in his prior two complaints. Beginning on May 15, 2020, Mr. Yi filed amended complaints in these actions, this time adding the State of Maryland as a Defendant in addition to Governor Hogan. Defendants filed motions to dismiss and/or for summary judgment as to these complaints, and on August 25, 2020

those motions were granted. After moving for reconsideration unsuccessfully, on October 9, 2020, plaintiff filed notices of appeal to the Court of Special Appeals in each of these matters. Plaintiff also sought waivers of the filing fees associated these appeals, which were denied. On January 6, 2021, the Court of Special Appeals dismissed the appeals for failure to pay the filing fee. On February 4, 2021, plaintiff filed a petition for writ of certiorari in the Court of Appeals, and also requested waiver of the filing fees. The Court of Appeals granted Mr. Yi's request for waiver of filing fees, and was scheduled to consider Mr. Yi's petition at conference on March 25, 2021. The petition for certiorari is still pending.

By September 1, 2022, the commission must submit to the Governor and the General Assembly a plan of action for the commemoration of the 400th anniversary of the founding of Maryland.

State Song

Senate Bill 8/House Bill 667 (both passed) repeal the State song, *Maryland! My Maryland!*

Elections

Absentee Voting/Ballot Drop Boxes

Due to concerns about the safety of in-person voting during the coronavirus pandemic, the number of voters casting absentee ballots in the 2020 elections greatly increased compared to previous elections. The State, and the local boards of elections, implemented many procedures to make absentee voting (referred to by election officials as “mail-in voting”) more accessible and convenient in 2020. These procedures included deploying hundreds of ballot drop boxes across the State that voters could use to return voted absentee ballots and sending (1) absentee ballots to all voters in the primary election and (2) absentee ballot applications to all voters in the general election. ***Senate Bill 683 (Ch. 56)*** and ***House Bill 1048 (passed)*** make several changes to increase access to absentee voting and improve the absentee voting process. The measures create a permanent absentee ballot list that any voter may apply to join. Voters on the list will receive an absentee ballot automatically for each election without having to apply for it. The State Board of Elections (SBE) is required to send a written communication to each voter on the list before each election confirming certain information and instructing the voter to notify the local board of elections if certain changes have occurred, such as a change in address. A voter is removed from the permanent absentee ballot list under certain circumstances, including if the voter fails to return an absentee ballot for two consecutive statewide general elections.

Additionally, ***Senate Bill 683*** and ***House Bill 1048*** define “ballot drop box” and establish procedures for determining the locations of ballot drop boxes. A local board must consider certain factors when determining the location of a ballot drop box (which are similar to the factors described further below with respect to early voting center locations) and submit ballot drop box locations to the State Administrator of Elections for approval. The State Administrator must require a local board to reconsider a ballot drop box location that does not meet the factors and may add ballot drop boxes in the county if the ballot drop box locations submitted after reconsideration by the local board still do not meet the factors. The measures also establish security requirements for ballot drop boxes, including monitoring by security cameras at all times. In addition, a local board must remove election-related materials from ballot drop boxes at least once each day in accordance with chain of custody procedures established by SBE. The measures prohibit canvassing, electioneering, or posting campaign material in a manner that obstructs access to a ballot drop box and prohibit placing campaign material or any other unauthorized material on a ballot drop box.

Senate Bill 683 and **House Bill 1048** also require each local board of elections to send an absentee ballot application to each eligible voter at least 60 days before the statewide primary elections in 2022 and 2024. This requirement does not apply to voters on the permanent absentee ballot list. Further, SBE must contract with a usability consultant on or before August 1, 2021, to review all the public informational materials and forms related to absentee voting produced by SBE and make recommendations for their improvement. SBE is required to report to the Senate Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee (1) on or before February 1, 2022, on the consultant's recommendations and the actions SBE has taken or plans to take to implement the recommendations and (2) on or before January 15, 2023, on the number of voters who voted in each precinct polling place in the State in 2018, 2020, and 2022.

The State and local governments are expected to incur various costs to implement **Senate Bill 683** and **House Bill 1048**, the most significant of which (among costs that have been quantified) is the cost for local boards of elections to send absentee ballot applications to voters before the 2022 and 2024 primary elections (estimated to be \$2.5 million in fiscal 2022 and \$2.2 million in fiscal 2024).

Early Voting

The General Assembly also passed legislation to expand access to early voting. **House Bill 745 (Ch. 43)** alters the number of early voting centers each county must establish based on the number of registered voters in the county, as shown in **Exhibit C-1.1**.

*An existing authorization for counties to establish one early voting center in addition to the required centers is continued under ***House Bill 745***.

The Act also requires a local board to take into account the following factors when determining the location of an early voting center:

- accessibility of the early voting center to historically disenfranchised communities, including cultural groups, ethnic groups, and minority groups;
- proximity of the early voting center to dense concentrations of voters;
- accessibility of the early voting center by public transportation;
- equitable distribution of early voting centers throughout the county; and
- maximization of voter participation, including through the use of community centers and public gathering places as locations for early voting centers.

As a result of additional early voting centers being required in certain counties, local government expenditures are expected to increase collectively by \$830,000 annually in fiscal 2022 and 2023, by \$900,000 annually in fiscal 2024 and 2025, and by \$1.1 million annually thereafter. State general fund expenditures are expected to increase by \$100,000 annually in fiscal 2022 and 2023, by \$105,000 annually in fiscal 2024 and 2025, and by \$120,000 annually thereafter.

Senate Bill 596/House Bill 206 (both passed) expand early voting center hours by requiring that the centers be open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on each early voting day during each

regular election, rather than from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. each early voting day during presidential general elections and 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. each early voting day during other regular elections.

Voting by Incarcerated Individuals

Individuals who are incarcerated are eligible to vote only if they are being detained while awaiting trial or are serving a sentence of imprisonment for a misdemeanor. **House Bill 222 (passed)** requires SBE to adopt regulations establishing a program to inform individuals who are incarcerated in a correctional facility and have the right to vote of upcoming elections and how they may exercise their right to vote. The bill applies to both State and local correctional facilities, including those operated by the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS), the Department of Juvenile Services, and the sheriff of a county or other unit of government with responsibility for operating a local correctional facility or county detention center.

The regulations must require SBE or local boards to (1) disseminate information on eligibility requirements to register to vote and voter registration applications to eligible voters in a correctional facility at least 30 days before the deadline to register to vote before each election; (2) disseminate instructions on absentee voting, absentee ballot applications, and absentee ballots before each election in a timely manner; (3) provide frequent opportunities for eligible voters in a correctional facility to register to vote and to vote; and (4) provide for the timely return of voter registration applications, absentee ballot applications, and absentee ballots completed by eligible voters in a correctional facility. The bill also requires SBE to submit an annual report to the Senate Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee on the implementation of the bill.

House Bill 222 also requires DPSCS to (1) provide each individual who is released from a correctional facility with a voter registration application and documentation informing the individual that the individual's voting rights have been restored; (2) display a sign in each parole and probation office indicating that any individual who is no longer incarcerated has the right to vote; and (3) post a notice on the department's website indicating that any individual who is no longer incarcerated has the right to vote.

Senate Bill 525 (passed) requires the Baltimore City centralized booking facility to provide a ballot drop box that eligible voters incarcerated at the facility may use to submit absentee ballot applications, absentee ballots, and voter registration forms to SBE or a local board of elections. The Baltimore City centralized booking facility must (1) disseminate written information about how and when to use the ballot drop box to each eligible voter incarcerated at the facility and (2) monitor the ballot drop box at all times. The State is required to pay for the ballot drop box. The Baltimore City Board of Elections is required to collect election-related materials deposited in the ballot drop box on at least a weekly basis and must submit an annual report to certain committees of the General Assembly on materials submitted using the ballot drop box. SBE must adopt regulations in collaboration with DPSCS to implement the bill.



Student and Military Voters

Senate Bill 283/House Bill 156 (both passed) include various measures to make it easier for students enrolled in institutions of higher education and members of the military to vote. The bills require public institutions of higher education to designate a staff member to serve as the student voting coordinator. The student voting coordinator is required to develop and implement a student voting plan to increase student voter registration and voting. The student voting plan must include, among other things, (1) wide dissemination of information about voter registration and voting opportunities to all students; (2) provision of voter registration materials on campus; (3) collaboration with the local board on the placement of an early voting center or precinct polling place on campus if requested by the local board; and (4) encouragement and support of student organizations working to increase student participation in elections. The bills also require private nonprofit institutions of higher education that receive operating or capital funding from the State to provide a link to the State's online voter registration system on the home page of the online portal used by students to register for course work. Public institutions of higher education are required to provide such a link under existing law. The bills require public institutions of higher education and private nonprofit institutions of higher education that receive State funds to relocate the link if there are fewer than 15 clicks on the link in any calendar year. The institutions are required to report annually on (1) the use of the link and (2) their efforts to encourage the use of the link and to improve access to voter registration for students.

Senate Bill 283/House Bill 156 also include provisions to increase access to voter registration and voting by members of the military. The bills require SBE to establish a process for an individual to submit the federal post card application electronically and use a common access card to sign a federal post card application. The federal post card application is a form required by federal law that absent uniformed services voters and overseas voters may use to simultaneously register to vote and request an absentee ballot. The common access card is an identification card issued by the U.S. Department of Defense to active-duty military personnel, eligible reserve personnel, Department of Defense civilian employees, and eligible Department of Defense contractor personnel.

Additionally, the bills require local boards of elections to contact and obtain input from large residential institutional communities, including institutions of higher education, military installations, continuing care retirement communities, and senior communities, when establishing precinct boundaries and designating the location of polling places.

Election Calendar

House Bill 738 (Ch. 117) establishes earlier dates, prior to primary and general elections, after which (1) successor candidates or nominees for Governor or Lieutenant Governor may no longer be designated in the event of a candidate's or nominee's death, withdrawal/declination, or disqualification and (2) the existing Governor and Lieutenant Governor unit remain on the ballot. The Act also establishes earlier dates for (1) submission of plain language summaries of constitutional amendment and referendum ballot questions to SBE and (2) public availability of the complete text of ballot questions.

Campaign Finance

The State provides public campaign financing to eligible gubernatorial tickets under the Public Financing Act. **Senate Bill 415 (passed)** makes various changes to the gubernatorial public financing system. The most significant changes include (1) requiring participating tickets to accept only small private contributions from individuals; (2) matching small private contributions with public funds on a sliding scale; (3) altering the amount of small private contributions a ticket must raise to qualify for the program; (4) requiring a participating ticket to raise small private contributions to receive public funds in the general election; (5) repealing expenditure limits for participating tickets; and (6) requiring the Governor to include appropriations for the system in the annual budget bill in certain fiscal years.

Under the existing system, participating gubernatorial tickets may accept private contributions up to the normal contribution limits from any contributor, including business entities and political action committees, but only that part of a monetary or in-kind contribution from an individual that does not exceed \$250 is eligible to be matched with public funds. **Senate Bill 415** prohibits participating tickets from accepting private contributions except private contributions from individuals that do not exceed \$250 in the aggregate during the election cycle. A participating ticket may, however, accept a contribution or loan from a member of the gubernatorial ticket or a spouse of a member of the gubernatorial ticket of up to \$50,000.

Under the existing system, in the primary election, each dollar of an eligible private contribution is matched with public funds at a one-to-one ratio, unless the participating ticket is unopposed. **Senate Bill 415** provides public matching funds for eligible private contributions on a sliding scale (with an “eligible private contribution” being a monetary private contribution of up to \$250 in the aggregate for the election cycle, from a resident of the State, and that is accompanied by documentation that the contribution is made with the donor’s personal funds). The first \$50 of an eligible private contribution is matched with public funds at an eight-to-one ratio, the second \$50 of an eligible private contribution is matched with public funds at a six-to-one ratio, the third \$50 of an eligible private contribution is matched with public funds at a two-to-one ratio, and the remaining \$100 of an eligible private contribution is not matched with public funds.

The existing system requires gubernatorial tickets, to qualify to participate in the public financing system, to raise “seed money” in an amount equaling 10% or more of the expenditure limit for the election. In 2018, the amount of seed money a qualifying ticket was required to raise was \$279,837. **Senate Bill 415** requires a gubernatorial ticket to raise 1,500 eligible private contributions and an aggregate total of \$120,000 to qualify to participate.

The existing system provides a lump sum public contribution for the general election equal to the expenditure limit to an eligible gubernatorial ticket that is nominated. A gubernatorial ticket is not required to raise eligible private contributions to receive a public contribution in the general election. **Senate Bill 415** repeals the lump sum public contribution for the general election and requires a participating gubernatorial ticket to raise eligible private contributions to receive public funds in the general election. The eligible private contributions are matched with public funds at the ratios described above.



The existing system limits total expenditures by participating gubernatorial tickets in accordance with a formula that is based on the population of the State and inflation. The expenditure limit applies separately to the primary and the general election. In 2018, the expenditure limit was \$2,798,370. **Senate Bill 415** repeals the expenditure limit. Participating gubernatorial tickets are authorized to spend as much as they can raise, provided that they abide by the contribution and loan limits described above. However, the amount of public contributions a gubernatorial ticket may receive is limited to \$3 million in each of the primary and the general elections.

The gubernatorial public financing system is funded through the Fair Campaign Financing Fund, which receives funding from a variety of sources, including a checkoff on the State income tax return and various penalties, fines, and fees imposed under State election law. There is currently \$3.8 million in the Fair Campaign Financing Fund. **Senate Bill 415** establishes a process that requires the Governor to include an appropriation in the annual budget bill for the appropriate fiscal year sufficient to supplement the balance in the fund in order to provide a full public contribution to two gubernatorial tickets in the primary election and one gubernatorial ticket in the general election. The bill also separately requires the Governor to include in the annual budget bill, for fiscal 2023, an appropriation of at least \$4.0 million to the fund. Under the bill, general fund expenditures increase by \$2.2 million in fiscal 2022 and by \$4.0 million in fiscal 2023. General fund expenditures increase in future years to the extent that the balance in the Fair Campaign Financing Fund is insufficient to provide a full public contribution to two gubernatorial tickets in the primary election and one gubernatorial ticket in the general election and additional funds are needed to make up the difference.

Senate Bill 415 also authorizes SBE to impose a civil penalty up to \$1,000 for certain violations of campaign finance law committed by an eligible gubernatorial ticket or an agent of an eligible gubernatorial ticket.

House Bill 1350 (passed) requires the treasurer of a campaign finance entity to approve, rather than make, all disbursements for the campaign finance entity. The bill also requires campaign finance entities to submit bank statements with their campaign finance reports for a certain period of time if the campaign finance entity is liable for a civil penalty imposed for (1) making a disbursement in an unauthorized manner; (2) failure to maintain a campaign bank account; (3) making a disbursement by an unauthorized method; (4) failure to maintain detailed and accurate account books and records; (5) fundraising during the General Assembly session in an unauthorized manner; and (6) failure to sufficiently report all contributions received and expenditures made on a campaign finance report. Bank statements submitted under the bill must document all expenditures made by or on behalf of the campaign finance entity during the reporting period and have all personal identifying information redacted. A campaign finance entity must submit a bank statement with the first campaign finance report due after it became liable for the specified civil penalty and continue to submit the statements until the later of (1) the conclusion of the election cycle in which the campaign finance entity became liable for the civil penalty or (2) the due date of the last campaign finance report that is due within two years after the campaign finance entity became liable for the civil penalty. After a campaign finance entity has submitted bank statements with at least one campaign finance report, SBE may, at its discretion, waive the

requirement that the campaign finance entity submit bank statements with subsequent campaign finance reports.

Senate Bill 310 (passed) requires a campaign finance entity of an individual to terminate and file a final campaign finance report within eight years after the later of (1) the end of the individual's most recent term of office and (2) the date of the election in which the individual last was a filed candidate. The bill repeals a provision that allows a campaign finance entity of an individual to continue until eight years after the payment of the final debt or other obligation of the entity. The bill also requires the State Administrator to, not later than six months before a campaign finance entity is required to terminate, notify the responsible officers of the campaign finance entity and the candidate of the date by which the campaign finance entity must (1) pay all outstanding obligations; (2) dispose of all its remaining assets in accordance with State law; and (3) terminate and file a final campaign finance report. The bill also alters the scope of an existing provision so that any termination of a campaign finance entity does not limit the right of (1) SBE, or the State Prosecutor or the State's Attorney, to pursue an enforcement action against the former responsible officers of, or any candidate formerly affiliated with, the campaign finance entity, or (2) a creditor to bring an action against the former responsible officers of, or any candidate affiliated with, the campaign finance entity.

General Assembly

Senate Bill 55 (passed) requires that, beginning January 1, 2024, to be eligible to serve as a Senator or Delegate in the General Assembly, a person must have maintained a primary place of abode in the district the person has been chosen to represent for a specified period of time before the person's election. The bill is a constitutional amendment and will not take effect unless approved by the voters in the 2022 general election. For a more detailed discussion of **Senate Bill 55**, see the subpart "General Assembly" within this part of this *90 Day Report*.

Political Parties

House Bill 1343 (passed) alters the manner in which members of the Anne Arundel County Republican Party Central Committee are elected by requiring the election of three members from each councilmanic district of the county and one member from the county at large, rather than the election of three members from each legislative district wholly within the county and one member from any legislative district partially within the county.

Ethics

Disclosures, Training, and Use of Confidential Information

The Maryland Public Ethics Law sets forth various requirements, prohibitions, and procedures relating to conflicts of interest and financial disclosure that apply to State and public officials and employees.
